Ten Commandments of Graded Work

- 1. Show your work so that a peer could follow your reasoning.
- 2. When you get stuck, consult with classmates, come to office hours, or send me an email.
- 3. Use separate paper, and label your problems. Do not squeeze work or answers into margins.
- 4. Illustrate with sketches where appropriate.
- 5. You may always use a calculator to do arithmetic.
- 6. Unless instructions say "by hand", you may use software (e.g. Wolfram Alpha) to do non-arithmetical calculations, e.g. integrals.
- 7. Solve analytically (algebra, trig, calculus) unless I say to do it graphically.
- 8. Don't round your answers from intermediate steps. Rounding error can compound.
- 9. Unless otherwise specified, final answers can be rounded to 3 or 4 significant digits.
- 10. If an "exact" answer is required, $\sqrt{2}$ is correct, but 1.414213562 is not.
